

USING TECHNOLOGY TO ADDRESS DIFFERENT LEVELS OF ENGLISH PROFICIENCY IN THE CLASSROOM

KRISTIN GRAYSON

Many teachers in K-12 public schools and professors in college courses feel overwhelmed by the increasing numbers of English language learners and their different levels of English proficiency in the mainstream classroom. This session will provide a new perspective on how technology can enhance the instructional methods teachers need to use with ELL students of all levels including adult, international, grade-level, and content classrooms.

Kristin Grayson is an education specialist at the Intercultural Development Research Association (IDRA), an independent, non-profit organization that advocates the right of every student to a quality education. With IDRA, she provides training and technical assistance to school districts and teachers that serve English language learners and to university faculty who train pre-service teachers. Her experience includes ESL, dual language, Spanish, and university teaching. She has a master's degree in bilingual, ESL, and multicultural education from the University of Central Oklahoma. She is proficient in English and Spanish.

VIRGINIA SPAVENTA, M.A. KEYNOTE SPEAKER

After spending 18 years in Argentina as an ESL teacher for students from kindergarten to adults and as a teacher educator and curriculum designer, Virginia taught in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, at the community college level, as well as in an elementary school setting. She also continued to work with curriculum design and teacher training. She is currently in the Neuropsychology department at the Wake Forest School of Medicine as a bilingual education specialist. She is involved in research focusing on literacy in the adult population and is a member of the WLT's (Wilson Language Training) Lead Trainer team.

Virginia has developed her own program in teaching language called "Language in Color, Sound, and Movement" and is preparing a tool kit for teachers with students needing to develop their fluency, phonemic awareness, and decoding skills. She is an exciting speaker whose passion for her work is clearly evident.

She completed her undergraduate work in the "University of El Salvador" in Buenos Aires, Argentina. Virginia received her M.Ed. in English as a Second Language from "El Instituto Superior Ramon Fernandez de Lenguas Vivas". She is certified to teach Spanish and English as a Second Language.
