Room 200 - Middle School Demands and Weak or Diverse Schemas of ESL Students Russann Wood, M. Ed., Mary Murray Stowe, M.Ed., Simmons Middle School

Students in middle school are expected traditionally to arrive with a specific set of skills in place to begin the new level of work. It is not expected that basic reading skills, reading comprehension, or learning strategies need to be taught and further developed to create the prior background knowledge necessary to comprehend the material. How do we handle this opportunity? Audience: Administration, Teacher Education

This presentation examines current practices in the assessment of ESL students and provides examples of criterion and norm-referenced measures. The author concludes that multiple measures are invaluable for ELL assessment and that measures of student growth or gain should be a component of the evaluation of ESL students. The experiment tested whether formulaic sequences are processed differently from nonformulaic phrases of similar length and frequency using an on-line grammaticality- judgment task. The findings showed that formulaic phrases were responded to significantly faster than generated phrases by both groups (native and nonnative speakers) Audience: Research

This study analyzes writing procedures of 30 NNS of English. Their hand movements were taped, and writing pauses were recorded. Chinese writers had more difficulty writing longer English words. Such findings are interesting, given that the pauses weren't due to the alphabetic relationship found between English, Spanish, and Arabic languages. **Audience:** Research

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
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
