- To advocate the recognition of the specialized nature of the TESOL profession on the local, state, and national levels.

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
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
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
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

Dr. Carol Johnson

In 1983, at the age of 30, Carol Johnson's world was suddenly turned upside down. Her son, Justin, was born six weeks premature. He came home weighing four



pounds and, after he struggled to reach the age of 10 months, Carol was told Justin had cerebral palsy and that he was brain damaged. Ignoring the expert's words that her son would be incapable of doing anything, Carol began to develop systems to counter his disabilities and to educate Justin. What she ultimately performed, some say, was a miracle. Through countless hours of patient trial and error, her son began to learn. Ultimately, her persistence and vision led to the creation of a revolutionary advance in second-language acquisition and teaching, and the Renaissance LearningTM software that is now known as English in a FlashTM.

Carol Johnson is a bilingual educator. In addition to 11 years of teaching experience, carol holds a Ph.D. in Second Language Acquisition & Teaching, specializing in how people learn second languages. A Senior Product Consultant for Renaissance Learning, she conducts research in schools nationwide.

Dr. Charlotte B. Tabereaux is the Education Director for the Mississippi State University Riley Center for Education and the Performing Arts in Meridian, MS, and former Executive Director of the Mississippi Arts & Entertainment Center. She is currently the Past-President of the Mississippi Alliance for Arts Education, an affiliate of the Kennedy Center Alliance for



Arts Education. She is currently serving a three-year term on the National Leadership Committee for the KCAAEN. Charlotte received a Ph.D. in Education Administration from Mississippi State University in 2002.

Charlotte taught English, drama, and speech for 20 years; for ten years she served as an administrator, in positions including principal, state department senior education specialist, director of curriculum, director of federal programs and arts supervisor. Dr. Tabereaux was also an adjunct professor of English at the University of Louisville (Kentucky), in the educational leadership doctoral program at Mississippi State University, and in the master's teaching degree program at Belhaven College. She co-authored a book, Learning to Read Through the Arts K-2 in 2003 and is a former field advisor for the Mississippi Arts Commission's Whole Schools Initiative. The "Arts Across the Curriculum" program that she developed earned the Rankin County School District the 2004 Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts. In 2004, she was named by the Mississippi Business Journal as one of the 50 Leading Business Women of Mississippi.

Charlotte's husband, Tom, is the president of Junior Achievement, Inc. of Mississippi. They have two sons: Jason, a graduate of the University of Mississippi, and Kevin, a senior at Mississippi State University.

Bradley Scott, Ph.D.

Senior Education Associate, Division of Professional Development Intercultural Development Research Association

Bradley Scott, Ph.D., an IDRA senior education associate, brings 36 years of experience to the field of education. At IDRA, he serves as director of the IDRA equity assistance center, the South Central Collaborative for Equity. He has conducted training and provided technical assistance in race and human relations, intrapersonal and interpersonal communication, management styles, leadership skills, excellence and equity in education, conflict resolution, team



building and embracing diversity in school settings, gender equity, and national origin equity. His broad background has been instrumental in his present capacity where he provides technical assistance and training to public school districts, school personnel, students in those schools, parents and community persons in the development and implementation of race desegregation plans, including assistance in coping with educational issues emerging from the desegregation process. The center works with school districts in Texas, New Mexico, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arkansas, in the preparation and adaptation of desegregation plans; community, parent and student involvement in the desegregated school setting; development of equal employment procedures and policies; establishment of nondiscriminatory policies; elimination of racially bias curricular materials, and the creation of alternative materials development of human relations activities to promote racial harmony in public schools.

Dr. Scott has authored and co-authored numerous publications at IDRA including Magnet Schools: Pockets of Excellence in a Sea of Diversity and It's a Matter of Race: Race Relations in a Desegregated Setting. He also co-authored IDRA's gender equity curriculum for middle school students, Minority Women in Science: Forging the Way.

Dr. Scott earned his doctor of philosophy with a concentration in educational administration from the University of Texas at Austin. His received a bachelor's degree in French and education from Grove City College in Pennsylvania and a master's degree in early childhood and elementary education from the University of Texas at San Antonio.

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
