



Lynda Franco has been an educator for the past 26 years. During that time she has taught all grades pre-K through grade 12, content-based, sheltered ESOL vocational classes, undergraduate courses, and graduate courses both in the United States and abroad. She also leads seminars for university faculty across the nation. Lynda has been an administrator of programs and a bilingual teacher/trainer for 17 years.

Presently, Lynda is president of Olé Education, a group of education reform specialists focusing on the needs of diverse learners. Until

December 2005, Lynda worked as the Assistant Director and Special Projects Director at the English Language Acquisition Unit for the Colorado Department of Education, where for three years she administered the state's Title II Teacher Quality Enhancement Grant, led statewide staff development projects centering on developing improved teaching skills for meeting the needs of English language learners (ELLs) including training trainers, developing training materials, and providing training to parents, university faculty, program administrators, teachers, and paraprofessionals. She also served as ELL advisor to the Colorado State Reading First initiatives. Lynda was awarded the 2006 Colorado Parent Involvement Award by the Colorado Statewide Parent Coalition.

As part of the Title II TQE grant, and in an effort to assist colleges of education at institutes of higher education throughout Colorado in updating their skills and programs, Lynda led numerous seminars at universities across the Colorado for university faculty. Professors attended these sessions to gain information they included in the teacher preparation classes they deliver. Professors modified their existing syllabi as a contingency of their participation.

For nine years, Lynda served as an adjunct instructor for the Education and World Languages and Linguistics Departments at the University of South Florida in Tampa, Florida, where she taught graduate and undergraduate courses in linguistics and ESOL education. Around the nation, she has led ESOL seminars for the professors of Colleges of Education at a number of universities where she assisted them in revising their existing curricula to include competencies centering on the needs of limited English speakers, including developing literacy skills. Lynda has worked on several national literacy initiatives, including Reading First, Reading Success Network, Reading Rescue, and Reading Recovery, specializing in issues for diverse learners.

Lynda is co-author of two Center for Applied Linguistic publications: Enhancing English Language Learning in Elementary Classrooms, a comprehensive professional development program for elementary teachers of

English language learners, and What's Different About Teaching Reading to English Language Learners? She authored the Teachers' Guides and 30 Phonics Readers to accompany the Delta Phonics series published by Delta Systems, Inc. She is co-author of the publications to lead workshops for parents in Spanish and English: Reading at Home With Your Child. She is also the author of the NABE Star Series Professional Development for Teachers and Administrators Working with English Language Learners, published by the National Association of Bilingual Education. She has developed a second language and literacy program and authored books for the Leap Pad, part of the Leap Frog educational toy company, and is editor of the ELL supplemental materials for the SRA Open Court series. In addition, she has authored government publications including A Guide to Assist Parents in Understanding Alternative Assessments and self-publishes The Harmonious Classroom Using Music to Develop Language and Literacy Skills. She is also advisor to the PBS children's program Between the Lions and other PBS shows in development. Her newest publications, companion materials to the nation's only phonics materials developed specifically for English language learners, Delta Phonics, is being presented at this year's National TESOL Conference in February.

#### **Differentiated Instruction**

## Presented by: Lynda Franco, Olé Education

#### Differentiated Instruction...

#### IS

A differentiated classroom offers a variety of learning options designed to tap into different readiness levels, interests, and learning profiles. In a differentiated class, the teacher uses (1) a variety of ways for students to explore curriculum content, (2) a variety of sense-making activities of processes through which students can some to understand and "own" information and ideas, and (3) a variety of options through which students can demonstrate or exhibit what they have learned.

#### IS NOT

A class is not differentiated when assignments are the same for all learners and the adjustments consists of varying the level of difficulty of questions for certain students, grading some students harder then others, or letting students who finish early play games for enrichment. It is not appropriate to have more advanced learners do extra math problems, extra book reports, or after completing their "regular work be given extension assignments. Asking students to do more of what they already know is hollow. Asking them to do "the regular work, plus..." inevitably seems punitive to them.

This presentation is designed to illustrate, through a demonstrative, hands-on format, a more detailed picture of what a differentiated classroom looks like – and doesn't look like – for all learners -- at all levels, k-12.



# "Closing the Achievement Gap for English Language Learners"

Dr. Yvonne Freeman is a professor of bilingual education and Dr. David Freeman is a professor of language arts/ESL at The University of Texas at Brownsville. Both are interested in literacy education for Facility II.

are interested in literacy education for English language learners. In addition to doing staff development with school districts across the country, they present regularly at international, national, and state

The Freemans have published books, articles and book chapters jointly and separately on the topics of second language teaching, biliteracy, bilingual education, and second language acquisition. Their newest book is the second edition of Teaching Reading and Writing in Spanish and English in Bilingual and Dual Language Classrooms. Their other books include: Dual Language Essentials for Teachers and Administrators, Essential Linguistics: What You Need to Know to Teach Reading, ESL, Spelling, Phonics, and Grammar, Closing the Achievement Gap: How to Reach Limited Formal Schooling and Long-Term English Learners, the second edition of Between Worlds: Access to Second Language Acquisition, which received the Mildenberger Award from the Modern Language Association for outstanding research in the field of foreign and second language teaching, La enseñanza de la lectura y la escritura en español en el aula bilingüe, and ESL/EFL Teaching: Principles for Success. In addition, to their other publications, the Freemans are authors of Harcourt Achieve/Rigby's ESL programs, On Our Way to English and Literacy by Design.

"Vogt's Top Ten: Or What I've Learned About Teaching Reading"

MaryEllen Vogt is Professor Emerita of Education at California State University, Long Beach. A former reading specialist and special education teacher for 15 years, she received her doctorate from the University of California, Berkeley. A co-author of six books, including Reading Specialists and Literacy Coaches in the Real World (2nd Ed.; 2007) and Making Content Comprehensible for English Learners: The SIOP Model (3rd Ed.; 2008), her research interests include improving comprehension in the content areas, teacher change and development, and content literacy and language acquisition for English learners. She was inducted into the California Reading Hall of Fame and received her university's Distinguished Faculty Teaching Award. She is a co-author/consultant of several reading and social studies programs published by Houghton Mifflin. Dr. Vogt served as President of the International Reading Association in 2004-2005.

## "Ten Things that I Wish I Had Known Before I Took Up TESOL"

Dr. Keith Folse is Associate Professor and Coordinator of the MATESOL Program at the University of Central Florida. He has taught ESL/EFL in the U.S., Saudi Arabia, Malaysia, Japan, and Kuwait. He has written over 40 textbooks on vocabulary,

composition, reading, speaking, and grammar and is a frequent presenter at regional and international TESOL conferences. His main research interests include understanding the role of vocabulary in ESL and identifying best teaching practices in diverse teaching settings.

Like many ESL teachers today, I did not set out to be an ESL teacher. In fact, like many of my colleagues, I accidentally stumbled into ESL. To be sure, it was a good stumble, but nonetheless, it was an indirect path.

I learned most of what I know today about teaching a second language through my actual teaching. Yes, I did learn some of the basics in my college education classes, but most of what I know I learned the hard way: while standing at a blackboard in my own classroom for the past twenty-seven years.

In this plenary, I will talk about ten of the many things that I learned during these years of teaching – things that I wish I had known beforehand. As you and I think back on the students that we have taught over the years—no matter whether we have taught for thirty, thirteen, or only three years—we know we have made some mistakes along the way. If only someone had told us certain things, our classes might have been somewhat different.



#### **Raymond Simon**

Deputy Secretary, U.S. Department of Education

President Bush nominated Raymond Simon to the position of United States Deputy Secretary of Education and the Senate confirmed him on May 26, 2005. As Deputy Secretary, Mr. Simon plays a pivotal role overseeing and managing the development of policies, recommendations and initiatives that help define a broad, coherent vision for achieving the President's education priorities, especially the No Child Left Behind Act. He also provides overall supervision and direction of

program organizations of the Department. He had previously served as the Assistant Secretary for Elementary and Secondary Education.

Simon was the Chief State School Officer for Arkansas for six years – a position he held until his initial appointment by President Bush. He also served as superintendent of the Conway (Arkansas) School District from 1991 to 1997.

A native of Conway, Arkansas, Simon has been involved in Arkansas education since 1966, when he began his career as a mathematics teacher at North Little Rock High School. While at North Little Rock, he was also Director of School Food Services and Director of Computer Services until moving back to Conway to serve as Assistant Superintendent for Finance. In addition, he has been an adjunct professor for both educational technology and school finance at the undergraduate and graduate levels.
