

■ Authentic Materials in the ESL Classroom

Beginning teachers or teachers who do not have the financial means to buy expensive ESL teaching materials will benefit from this discussion about the theoretical and practical aspects of using authentic materials in ESL instruction, followed by some tips on how to get the most out of these teaching tools.

"R.O.A.R" Reach Out and Read

What happens in one ESOL pull-out program to encourage reading and writing? What does research say and how can research be applied to help elementary ESOL students? This presentation will show how one teacher uses books, poems, shared writing, and other techniques to help students R.O.A.R.!

Presenter: Janice Thornton Cate has been an ESOL teacher for over 10 years. She has a BS and an M.Ed. from Mississippi State University, and has taken TESOL courses at the University of Southern Mississippi.

■ L1 Aspects and Effects on Acquisition of English Past Tense

This presentation looks at different studies (in formal and informal settings) on the acquisition of verbal morphology and focuses mainly on students of English whose L1 is Spanish. Particular emphasis is given to the effect of L1 aspect/aktionsart on the acquisition of English past tense, by way of contrasting uses of Spanish imperfect/pretérito with English simple past and past progressive.

The Presenter: Alicia Cipria, Ph.D. in Spanish Linguistics, is interested in aspectual and temporal topics of Spanish, and linguistic theory as applied to language teaching and translation

■ Presenting Second Language Acquisition Processes to the Mainstream Classroom Teacher

This presentation examines the nature of language and the essentials of first and second language acquisition processes, providing ESL teachers with an approach to explaining these concepts to mainstream classroom teachers. The session will include a discussion of the critical period hypothesis and its implications for K-12 teahers.

■ Students Learn Best When......

Learning environments unquestionably encourage or impede language acquisition. What conditions best help students acquiring English become effective, productive language learners and users. In this session, participants will call upon some of their own learning experiences and then consider the implications of those experiences for their day-to-day teaching practicies.

The Presenter: Having worked in Vietnam, Laos, China, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Ecuador, Mexico, and The US, Daved E Luellen Ph.D., brings extensive global experience to any ESOL setting.

■ Teaching English with Video

Japan's Ministry of Education requires the use of authorized English textbooks in junior and senior high school English classes. These textbooks seek to integrate subject matter and grammar in a balanced manner. The presenter provides examples of how to supplement the authorized textbooks by videos developed for the textbooks.

The presenter: Dr. Takahiko Hattori is associate professor of foreign studies at Otsuma Women's University in Tokyo, Japan.

■ The B.I.O. Track; successful Strategy to Start ESL Instruction

The B.I.O. Track focuses on the Hispanic students' sense of Belonging, Identity building, and Ownership acquisition (B.I.O.), which helps LEP students cross their educational and cultural barriers. Use of the B.I.O. Track has decreased the Hispanic drop-out rate at Collinsville from 100% in 1998 to 0% in 1999 and 2000.

The Presenter: Hernan Prado, MA, is the coordinator for the PACERS Hispanic Programs at the University of Alabama, and has developed the ESL program for rural schools in North Alabama.

■ A Dual Immersion Experience

Susan Nava and Pamela Bearden

This presentation will discuss a dual immersion class experience with preschoolers. The presenters will explain how, through a grant, the program was set up, what was taught, and how it worked out. They will also discuss the qualities of a good language learner.

The Presenters: Susan Nava has 3 children ages 14, 11, and 9. She lives and works in the Hispanic community in Decatur, AL, and has taught ESL on Adult, secondary and elementary levels. She is currently working on her masters in ESL/BE at the University of Alabama inTuscaloosa. Pamela Bearden teaches Spanish, English, and Fine Arts at Maplesville High School. She is currently working on a masters in ESL.

■ Affective Filter – How do I Deal with it?

This paper will discuss Krashen's Affective Filter Theory, the consequences of high affective filter in the ESL classroom, and suggestions on how to lower learners' anxiety and tension in the ESL classroom. It is fundamental that learners and educators are relaxed and stress-free in order for language acquisition to take place. Accordingly, contemporary research has shown the importance of our students' self-esteem in the process of learning a second language. Therefore, the teacher plays a major role in lowering anxiety in his or her classroom. By doing so, the instructor will transform the acquisition of a second language into an enjoyable and memorable experience.

The Presenter: Eliana Campbell is currently a graduate student at the University of Alabama, where she is enrolled in the Program for Advocacy Fellows in ESL certification K-12. She teaches secondary school Spanish for Piedmont City Schools.

Empowering Students to Recognize and Produce Features of English Intonation

Through exposure to and analysis of taped segments of native speaker conversations, teachers can facilitate students to recognize features of English intonation and context that will help them distinguish questions from statements and present perfect progressive verb forms from past perfect progressive verb forms. Suggested classroom activities for enhancing student production will be presented.

The Presenter: Susan Olmstead-Wang, a student in the Applied Linguistics Ph.D. program at the University of Alabama, holds Masters degrees in TESOL and English literature

■ Classroom Communication and Oral Presentations: A University Bridge Course

Learning intercultural academic communication in the classroom and technical presentation styles such as PowerPoint and Poster Presentations with pronunciation emphasis can help international students at the graduate level. Developing course expectations with different academic departments also builds relationships to allow more international student integration.

The Presenter: Molly Watkins has an MA in English with TESOL certification. She has taught in China and currently teaches and plans cultural events for the ESL center at MSU.

■ Linking Service and Learning outside the ESL Classroom

Service Learning as a pedagogical approach to English language acquisition provides some very practical applications for *real life* English. Because it links course specific objectives to community service work, Service Learning can get students out into the community practicing their *textbook* English while exploring their new surroundings and examining social, environmental, and economic issues within the community.

The Presenter: Beryl Odom has taught ESL classes at Gadsden State Community College for 19 years and been an educator for over 30 years. Whether cooking up her trademark Cajun recipes for family and friends or dishing up international cuisine at the dinners her church sponsors for GSCC's international students once a month, Beryl enjoys the teaching-learning cycle in education; that is, she learns as much from her students as they do from her. Service Learning is yet another innovative approach, she claims, to breathing life into textbooks and putting knowledge to work.

Listening as a Gateway to Speaking

This presentation consists of a demostration of techniques that focus on using listening material as the basis of speaking activities. The presenter will focus on communicative, student-generated activities which require critical thinking and / or problem solving.
